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## From the Facilitator

As I look at all of you, my coworkers throughout the state, I see some of us are walking more closely with teens or little ones; some of us with those in physical or spiritual need; and some of us with multiple parish communities and with all ages, all at one time. Too many times, the pope said, "we are faith-checkers instead of facilitators of the people's faith."\*

As we continue our ministry, my prayer is that no matter who or how many we serve, that we will live up to Pope Francis' call. May we never fall into the trap of being just 'faith checkers.'

May the Holy Spirit guide and strengthen us – individually and as Church – throughout the challenges and joys ahead, and may this summer bring you peace and joy.

## Pro-CLAYM

- The diocese hosted a Crisis Planning Meeting, many parishes are now working on improving and implementing plans for their programs. Bishop Ricken determined a final list of five textbooks that parishes and schools will choose from for grades 1-8. High school materials will be examined next year.

ProCLAYMs end-of-year R&R Day (Wrap Up & Recognition), was held May 9 with the theme, ‘Catch the Faith.’ A tour of Lambeau Field with lunch and awards for those completing Emmaus or Master’s of Theology was a part of the day. We also recognized Good and Faithful Servants who are outstanding professionals or volunteers in the parish or diocese, as well as retirees from the field.

Kick Off Day will take place September 19, 2013. Dr. John Craghan will speak on the “Joy of Discipleship In Relation to the Scriptures” followed by lunch and break out sessions where good ideas and best practices will be shared.

Kathy Cornette is the new WDREF rep who joins Theresa Alberts and Anne Stemper. Kathy is taking the position vacated by Mike Lotto. Improving catechist training opportunities continue. Catechetical programs at parishes and schools include classes for catechists in their schedules. These follow the Bishop’s plan to provide foundational, as well as advanced adult training in Morality, Sacraments & Liturgy, Scripture, Prayer & Spirituality, Creed, and Methods over a six-year period.

Betty Manion is the new President for 2013-14 with Mary Carter as vice-president.

## SUMMIT

Our final formal SUMMIT gathering of the 2012-2013 year was held on April 11. Dr. Larry Huiras of St Patrick parish in Hudson and Mrs. Colleen Monfre of the Burnett County Tri-Cluster parishes were the presenters during our morning educational/formational session. They gave us great insights into preparing a personal/professional mission statement, as well as items from their “DRE” Tool Box.

On May 9, several of our members gathered for a “Pray and Play” day at St. Francis Solanus parish and school in Reserve, near Stone Lake. It is a mission parish, which serves many Native Americans in that area. The school children performed their play about the life of Kateri Tekakwitha during the WDREF Conference in Siren last November and on May 9, the children treated our group to some special dances, which have high importance for their culture.

the same day. Thanks to the efforts of Joanie McKeown, we do have our first gathering scheduled with presenter, Mr. Dennis Kurtz from St. Mary's Press. This will be on Thursday, Sept. 5. Location is yet to be determined. We are looking at opening it up to catechists, as well as catechetical leaders from outside the Superior diocese, and of course that would have an effect on the size of facility needed.

### WDREF Board Highlights

#### **Retreat: October 24-25, 2013**

Led by Fr. James Kubicki, National Director for the Apostolate of Prayer, this fall's retreat, "Living Our Baptism as Priest, Prophet, King," promises to be a beautiful opportunity for prayer. The retreat will include evening prayer, opportunities for Reconciliation and Adoration, personal quiet time, and group conversation. Official flyers will be mailed soon.

#### **Conference 2014:**

The 2014 conference will be hosted by ProCLAYM, and they are even now getting to work, contacting potential speakers and locations. The theme is "We Are A People of Faith" and artwork is already being developed. The main presenter will be Matt Weber, author of "Fearing the Stigmata." Loyola Press will sponsor him.

#### **PDC (Professional Development Committee)**

Work continues on gathering ideas for "Best Practices on Prayer." Betty Manion (incoming president, ProCLAYM) will approach Liguori, Pflaum, OSV, and 23rd Publications about publishing the first Best Practices CD and potentially our next ones. Other current projects include promoting NCCL's USCCB approved National Certification process and finishing the list of colleges and universities.

#### **Communications Committee:**

The committee continues to move WDREF toward better usage of electronic communication and media. An extensive discussion took place about using the service Constant Contact in place of sending the newsletter as a pdf. There are exciting possibilities for sending as well as tracking information that WDREF wants to share. Thank you to Sarah Karlen, who continues to do a great job with the web site, and who put together an excellent proposal on Constant Contact for the WDREF board.

#### **Visioning**

Although this committee had not met, the hope is that each local organization will continue to take time each year to develop at least one goal and share it with WDREF. It is possible that in light of the Province Dialogue and the work of the PDC committee, more direction will develop for the committee.

#### **Of Special Note: St. Anthony Spirituality Center**

As of January 2014, the Capuchin priests will no longer staff the Spirituality Center. A group from the Spirituality Center is discussing with the Capuchin leadership the possibility of the Spirituality Center remaining open since it is operating in the black. While it is our great hope that St. Anthony's will continue to be WDREF's host location, we will be exploring the costs of some other meeting location options.

Each year at their spring meeting the WDREF Board engages in a dialogue with representatives from the Province of Wisconsin's Diocesan offices responsible for faith formation, and local organization Presidents. The topic for this dialogue is chosen in advance by the Board. This year's dialogue, held May 14 at St. Anthony Spirituality Center in Marathon (WI), addressed the topic of "Multi-Parish Faith Formation Ministry," which the Board recognizes as a growing reality throughout the state and the country.

The dialogue identified strengths and challenges of multi-parish formation ministry, what can be learned from each other's experience with collaboration, and from these, ways WDREF can take the lead in addressing the topic statewide.

### ***Strengths of multi-parish formation ministry:***

- Collaboration gives us a sense of the Church being larger than our individual parishes
- Opportunity for smaller parishes to remain viable through the sharing of personnel and resources
- Offers experiences of diversity
- Encourages individuals to serve as mentors to others

### ***Challenges of multi-parish formation ministry:***

- Fear of loss of funds
- Facilities
- Local input
- Distance
- Theological diversity between parishes and pastors
- Impact of dealing with more than one school district

Discussion around what can be learned from each other, despite different settings and programs, and some of the best spiritual, mental, and practical "takeaways" raised creative results. These included the need to keep our current experience in perspective as we consider the situation.

Other world regions are dealing with even greater challenges. There is a need to develop the sense that we're called to be disciples, everywhere, no matter what the circumstances, to keep in mind that multiple parish ministry is no longer new and that it has been successful in many places, to remember that youth we serve are often most willing to adapt to new models. Moving slowly, and letting a multiple parish ministry develop gradually and naturally were identified as important.

Additionally, the group identified the need for setting clear job descriptions and expectations, attending to the spiritual and formational needs of ministers, and that hospitality and welcoming are crucial to the process of collaboration.

At the conclusion of the morning of dialogue, ways in which WDREF can take the lead in addressing the topic statewide were delineated. These included the exploration of mentoring possibilities (pairing professional PCLs with volunteers and part-time ministers), and promoting models that have a proven record of success. It was noted that books and articles have been published on multiple parish ministry in general, but little has come forth regarding formation ministry in particular.

To answer this need, the organization will address the topic from various perspectives, including through the WDREF newsletter, "Faith for Today" and our biennial Conference. The Professional Development Committee will oversee these and other efforts to address multiple parish formation ministries as we move creatively into the future.

In 1995 he became the Wisconsin Province Director of the Apostleship

of Prayer, and in 1997 he became a member of the Apostleship's national Board of Directors. He became National Director on July 31, 2003.

Lord Jesus Christ,

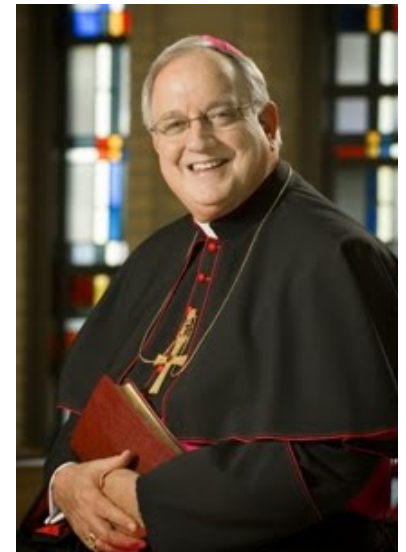
Watch over those who are leaders in your Church. Keep them faithful to their vocation and to the proclamation of your message. Teach them to recognize and interpret the signs of the times.

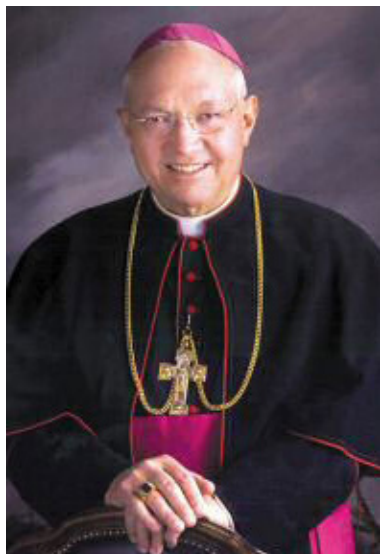

# On Location.....

*A tribute to a special place*

For close to 30 years WDREF has had a close connection with St. Anthony's Spirituality Center in Marathon City, WI, located about 12 mi. west of Wausau. The federation has been blessed by having St. Anthony's and its hospitable staff and environment welcome us several times each year for board meetings and retreats.

The history of St. Anthony's begins in 1917 when the Capuchin Franciscans chose 45 acres in Marathon, WI as the site of their new house of studies, which would be under the patronage of St. Anthony of Padua, the founder of the first Franciscan school. Those who are familiar with St. Anthony's heavily wooded property would be surprised to learn that the land was originally an open field. The landscaping of today, which includes pine, birch and maple forest, a pond, grotto, stations of the cross, and hiking paths were all added over the years.

The cornerstone of the new building was laid in July of 1918 about two months after construction began. Much of the work was done by the friars themselves with the assistance of their new neighbors who often donated not just their time, but materials too. The door latches in the original building are a unique, handcrafted feature. In order to save on the cost of hundreds of doorknobs and locks, the friars came up with their own alternative made entirely of wood. A first

visit to St. Anthony's always necessitates a short instruction on how to lock and open your bedroom door! On August 15, 1919 the new building, consisting of three wings surrounding an inner courtyard and chapel was dedicated. In 1923 a fourth side of the quadrangle was completed making the courtyard completely enclosed.

Until 1970, St. Anthony Friary served as a house of studies for the Capuchins instructing junior members of the community in philosophy and theology. The vocations boom following WWII led to the addition of another wing on the east side of the building in 1963. By 1970 the number of students had decreased and the community desired their seminarians to be exposed to a more diverse world than rural Marathon City could provide, so the house of studies was closed.

Soon after it was discerned that the building would be reopened as St. Anthony's Retreat Center, which almost immediately was successful with over 600 retreatants the first year. Since then, St. Anthony's has hosted countless numbers of persons and groups seeking solitude, spiritual direction, or a place for meetings. A few years ago its name was changed to St. Anthony Spirituality Center in order to reflect the diverse nature of the groups who utilize it.



Recently St. Anthony's has reached another crossroads in its history. As with so many religious communities today, the St. Joseph Province of the Capuchin Franciscans has discerned that they will no longer be able to sponsor the center due to the declining number of community members in active ministry.

The Center's board of directors is exploring plans to keep St. Anthony's open and thriving for many years to come. They have scheduled three prayer and discernment sessions to facilitate carry out their planning, and invite all interested persons to participate.
